It's also to consider want opposed to need when it comes to the resume vs. the CV. Often, people believe that in order to write a successful resume, they must try to encapsulate every piece of information about their professional past. This is a mistake. Employers are busier than ever these days and it helps a great deal if you can keep the resume down to one or two pages. Don't assume just because you want a longer document that you necessarily need a CV.

Again, the CV is primarily for very specific types of jobs. Be certain that before you write the CV, you have considered if this is necessary or if a resume will meet your needs. It will likely make a big difference in whether or not you get the interview and ultimately, the job.
